ANNE OF GREEN GABLES

Each year, Anne of Green Gables attracts more fans, especially with the Audible adaptation and the Netflix series bringing visitors to the Island. The latest interpretation, created by a talented all-female team, is sure to delight Anne herself.

Imagine dreaming of the Lake of Shining Waters, running down a red clay road, or wandering through the Haunted Wood and Lover's Lane. While fictional, Anne's world is very much alive in the hearts of Islanders and her admirers. Attractions across the Island pay tribute to our beloved Anne and her creator, Lucy Maud Montgomery.

In Charlottetown, enjoy Anne & Gilbert: The Musical at The Guild. In Cavendish, visit Green Gables Heritage Place, explore the Anne of Green Gables Museum in Park Corner, and swing by Lower

Bedeque to see the school where Anne taught. You can almost picture her playfully hitting Gilbert with a chalkboard! Discover the profound influence this Island had on Lucy Maud Montgomery, and you'll understand why Anne was so enchanted by life here. Braid your pigtails and come explore Anne's land!

To delve into the rich history behind Anne's phenomenon, start with Lucy Maud Montgomery herself. Born in 1874 on the north shore of Prince Edward Island and raised in Cavendish by her grandparents, she wrote her most famous novel amid this beautiful landscape. Visit her birthplace, the sites of her marriage, and the school where she taught to see how her surroundings inspired Anne of Green Gables.

In 2019, Parks Canada completed a comprehensive rehabilitation of the Green Gables site, featuring a

new visitor center with an exhibit hall, gift shop, and café, along with updated interpretive elements.



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Outdoors



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***Prince Edward Island has endless possibilities for adventure.** It's no secret that the people here are passionate about outdoor adventure. With 1,600 km of coastline and the warmest waters north of the Carolinas, going out to sea for adventure is a wonderful place to start. Kayak through scenic Rustico Harbour, test your balance and try stand-up paddle boarding in Malpeque Bay's International Migratory Site, get your adrenaline pumping by kiteboarding, swim at our beautiful beaches, or climb aboard a boat to explore our marine life. Aquatic adventure isn't all that you will find on this Island though. There are many hiking, cycling, and mountain bike trails to get that adrenaline rush!*

The Island Walk - Launched in Fall 2021, The Island Walk is a 700 km walking trail that loops around PEI. It takes approximately 32 days to complete (20-25 kilometres per day) and was inspired by the Camino de Santiago in Spain. There are many opportunities to complete the Island Walk in sections and spend more time exploring certain areas that appeal to you. The trail will take you along the ocean, much of the Confederation Trail, red dirt roads, beaches and through quiet secondary roads the outer perimeter of the Island, with a mix of inland and coastal sections. The trail intertwines through PEI's two major cities, Charlottetown and Summerside, and also through many small communities throughout the Island – a wide circle which allows walkers to end the walk where they started.

Scenic Coastal Drives - Touring Prince Edward Island's three scenic coastal drives is a perfect way to explore the Island. With over 45 harbours scattered throughout the jagged coastline, colorful fishing villages, lighthouses, antique shops, and restaurants serving up the freshest of our delicious Island cuisine, there will always be reasons to stop and explore. Check out the storybook villages of Victoria-by-the-Sea, Cavendish, Georgetown, Souris, or Tignish.

Harness Racing - Did you know there are more horses per capita in PEI than anywhere else in North America? Often known as the Kentucky of Canada, visitors come from around the world to experience this authentic Island tradition. The history of harness racing runs deep in the roots of Islanders dating back to 1886. You'll find small training facilities and racetracks as you drive across the Island, but the real action takes place at Red Shores at the Charlottetown Driving Park and in Summerside.



Unique Accommodations

Prince Edward Island has a large selection of accommodations from camping to luxury inns, but we also have several truly unique places to stay and relax.

West Point Lighthouse -

Featuring 13 contemporary rooms and the rare opportunity to stay in a lighthouse. Each room has a breathtaking view of the Northumberland Strait from the shore of West Point, Prince Edward Island. Eleven rooms also feature walkout decks, while The Keeper's Quarters and The Tower Room are located in a private guests-only section of the historic West Point Lighthouse Museum.

The Inn at Fortune Bridge - The Inn at Bay Fortune's sister property opened in 2019. Owned and operated by Food Network Celebrity Chef Michael Smith and Chastity Smith, this 6 room boutique inn has been created from the community's general store. The property has gone through extensive renovations and has become one of Prince Edward Island's leading country inns! A 1957 Bentley will pick guests up at the Inn At Fortune Bridge and take them to the Fireworks Feast around the corner at the Inn at Bay Fortune for one of the most authentic and immersive food experiences in the world.

Dalvey by the Sea - Step back in time at this Victorian historic landmark, offering 25 guest rooms where the dining room is open daily for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Guests can enjoy a range of activities, including croquet, scenic nature trails, beach walks, and bike rentals. Paddle a kayak or canoe across picturesque Dalvey Lake—the site of the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge's dragon boat race on July 4, 2011. All just steps away from one of Prince Edward Island's pristine National Park beaches.

The Sydney Boutique Inn - one of Charlottetown's most luxurious destinations. While traditions of the former 1857 Notre Dame Academy remain, 18 distinctive, elegant and timeless suites have been created to surpass the clients' expectations. All modern conveniences and amenities have been incorporated into the design. The property is located in the historic district of the city close to theatre, shopping, the waterfront and boardwalk. A 5-star inn with downtown convenience.

Nature Space Resort - Nature Space Resort, which opened in 2020, offers a range of on-the-water tours and yoga retreats. In 2021, the resort expanded to include new yurt accommodations. This inviting destination allows guests to explore local flavors, engage in unique experiences, and discover beautiful landscapes, all while fostering a deeper connection to themselves, others, and the natural world.

Floating Wine Barrel - These floating wine barrels offer one-of-a-kind accommodations in small town, Murray Harbour. A floating red cedar panoramic 'wine barrel' cabin will showcase stunning views overlooking the water. Kick back at your own floating tiki bar and enjoy a beverage from a nearby local winery, cidery or brewery. 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Interesting Facts about *Prince Edward Island*

PEI is the smallest province in Canada with a population of just over 170,000. Although small, we host 1.5 million visitors yearly.

The Island boasts over **90 beaches**, each with its own special feature – white-sand beaches and dunes on the north side and red-sand and cliffs on the south side of the Island. It is common to have an entire beach to yourself.

The **Confederation Bridge** is an 8-mile engineering marvel that connects the Island to the mainland. It's the longest bridge in the world crossing ice-covered water.

There are **425 beef farms** on Prince Edward Island.

There are **61 lighthouses** on the Island; one for each week of the year and 35 that are still operational. Eight are open to the public and one even operates as an inn!

The Island is home to the world's most beloved red-haired orphan, **Anne of Green Gables**. The novel has sold more than 50 million copies and is translated into 18 languages. Listed on Indigo Books & Music Inc. Booklovers' Top Ten "Life-changing Books" of the past decade.

Canada's #1 golf destination with over 25 golf courses and the only Canadian province to host the Golf Channel's popular Big Break series.

The flavour of **oysters** reflects the water quality, minerals, salinity, and the type of nutrients available in the water. Prince Edward Island has a variety of different bays and coves that provide numerous distinct tastes and are distributed under a variety of brands, the most famous being Malpeque. Harvesting methods include the use of rakes and tongs.



Beside Oysters, PEI accounts for **80 percent of Canadian mussel** production, with more than 39.6 million pounds of mussels.

The **Island's soil is red** due to the iron oxide which rusts on exposure to air – and great for producing potatoes! There are 85,300 acres of **potatoes** grown annually representing \$276 million in farm gate sales.

Epekwitk is the Mi'kmaq word for Prince Edward Island and is often interpreted as **"it is lying on the water."** Other monikers include Garden of the Gulf, Canada's Food Island, The Island, and "the fairest land 'tis possible to see" (according to Jacques Cartier in 1534).





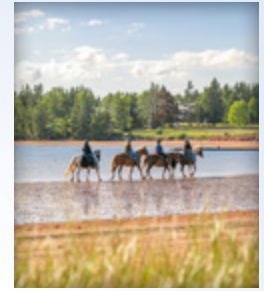
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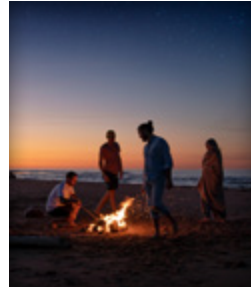
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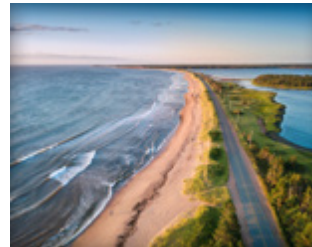
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
