"We're visiting in September and want to experience a local farmer harvesting potatoes."

Hi there,

Thank you for inquiring about the potato harvest. On PEI, the main potato crop starts to be harvested in September. The specific start date usually depends on how much rain we have received.

There are two experiences available that may be of interest to you.

From the **Canadian Potato Museum in O'Leary**, Farm Tours include a visit to a local farm (until mid-September only).

In Kinkora, the Roberts family offers **Tators, Tractors & Tales**, an Authentic PEI Experience which also includes a visit to a working farm.

During your stay, look for potato farms in rural communities across PEI. You'll find concentrations in Tyne Valley, O'Leary, Kensington, Kinkora, Cardigan, Vernon Bridge and Rollo Bay, to name only a few.

With over **86,000 acres of potatoes** grown here, it is not difficult to find nearby fields.

Prince Edward Island is a culinary paradise where every ingredient tells a story of the Island's rich soil, clean waters and passionate producers. Here, food is more than nourishment – it's a way of life. Talented chefs, fishers and farmers take pride in delighting your palette with the freshest and tastiest flavours. PEI is renowned for its shellfish: succulent lobster, delectable mussels and tasty oysters. Potatoes, beef and dairy are also central to our culinary identity and are featured prominently in traditional menus and upscale cuisine. "Where's the best place to eat?" is such a popular question that we've

created the Canada's Food Island Itinerary (scan the QR code to view). Pair local cuisine with stunning coastlines and vistas and you'll find every bite as unforgettable as the scenery. Local food producers are valued all year, but in late summer and fall we celebrate the harvest with the Sommo Festival and the PEI International Shellfish Festival in September, the acclaimed Fall Flavours Food & Drink Festival running from September to October and Farm Day in the City in October. **Come savour the unique flavours and culinary traditions of our Island.**

"Where are the best fresh oysters?"

Good afternoon,

PEI is a true oyster paradise. With cold, clean waters and a long tradition of oyster farming, the Island produces some of the world's most sought-after oysters. Whether you like them freshly shucked, baked Rockefeller-style, or paired with a crisp glass of wine, PEI has plenty of restaurants where you can enjoy these salty-sweet gems. Here are some of the best spots to slurp, savour, and celebrate PEI oysters.

Firstly, **The Claddagh Oyster House** in Charlottetown is an iconic restaurant. Enjoying their Oysters Rockefeller in a modern, elegant space is a no brainer!

Sea Rocket has a heavy focus on seafood and shellfish. Located in the heart of historic downtown Charlottetown, they offer oysters baked three ways: Rockefeller, Miso Aioli and Champagne Cream - a great opportunity to try some variations on the classic Rockefeller. My favourite is the Champagne Cream.

Sims Corner Steakhouse and Oyster Bar has a great oyster program and pulls all the stops for an incredible oyster degustation including caviar add ons!

If you are looking for scenic oyster experiences outside of the capital, there are lots of options:

The Wheelhouse in Georgetown is known for super-fresh local oysters and a relaxed waterfront setting. **Carr's Oyster Bar** in Stanley Bridge is rustic, cozy, and a true PEI classic, where oysters come straight from the waters nearby. The service is also super friendly; it's like visiting a friend's house!

There's even an oyster outlet which is part retail, part restaurant. **Brackley Bay Oyster Co.** is a fantastic example of this. They sell the oysters they grow. You can enjoy multiple varieties of their oysters with all of the fixings right on their patio.

Enjoy, and be sure to slurp oysters from tip to tip. It will be a one-of-a-kind experience that you'll remember forever!



Coastal Drives & Lighthouses

PEI's three coastal drives offer beautiful vistas, cultural landmarks and 61 iconic lighthouses to guide your way. Along every route, you'll encounter classic Island scenery, from fishing boats and painted historic houses to scenic lookouts and breathtaking pastoral views.



North Cape Coastal Drive is Canada's Oyster Coast and home to the longest natural rock reef in North America. Here, Mi'kmaq and Acadian cultures blend with rugged coastal beauty.



Central Coastal Drive spans from the Confederation Bridge to the PEI National Park along the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Visit Victoria-by-the-Sea for epic lobster rolls and head to Green Gables Shore for tee time or playtime.



Points East Coastal Drive features more than 50 incredible beaches. Enjoy the beauty of the Greenwich Dunes, a new perspective atop the Point Prim Lighthouse and the calm of watching the sun set at Sally's Beach. **Wherever you travel, PEI's quaint towns and rural communities are places where you can slow down, make connections and breathe in the ocean air.**

A haven for beach and nature lovers with over 1,100 km of shoreline and endless public beaches. From the iconic red cliffs of Cavendish Beach to the parabolic dune system at Greenwich, PEI National Park, each site has its own charm. Stroll along the beach at Basin Head, known for its “singing sands” or dip into the warm waters of the Northumberland Strait at Chelton Beach with a view of the Confederation Bridge. Choose the south side for warm water and red sand or the north side for its rolling surf and pristine white sand. Relax in the sunshine, take a dip, make a sandcastle and watch the sunset over the ocean. There is nothing quite like the beach in any season. For added peace of

"Where are the nicest day beaches near Summerside with washrooms on site?"

Hi! Here are some beaches close to Summerside that have washrooms on site:

Linkletter Provincial Park: Located just 8 km west of Summerside, this park offers a bay beach, playground, laundromat and kitchen shelter. Pets are permitted on leash. This is a beautiful location.

Chelton Beach Provincial Park: 25 minutes away, this day-use park features views of the Confederation Bridge, red sand beaches, and warmer waters typical of PEI's south shore. It offers a playground, shower facilities, toilets and lifeguard service (in season). It is ideal for stand-up paddleboarding and kayaking. Visitors love the well-maintained grounds. This beach is especially spectacular at low tide for beachcombing. Pets are permitted on leash.

Cabot Beach Provincial Park: Located less than 30 minutes from Summerside, this park offers an accessible beach with lifeguard services (in season). It also has a laundromat, playground and kitchen shelter. Pets are permitted on leash. This is another stunning location for a beach day.

Many courses are nestled along rivers or the coast, blending natural beauty with unforgettable play, whether you're a beginner or a seasoned pro. When your destination is golf, Prince Edward Island offers affordable rounds and packages to fit all needs – personal, group and

Hi! The Island is the perfect golf destination for many reasons, but one that sticks out is the proximity of courses within a short distance. Your course selections really depend on where you are staying.

If you are staying in eastern PEI, **Crowbush, Brudenell, Dundarave and Avondale** are all close and great options. As a bonus, **Belfast** is also a great 9-hole course.

If you're on the North Shore, **Glasgow Hills, Green Gables, Eagles Glenn and Andersons Creek** are all within 10 minutes or less of each other. **Red Sands** as a 9-hole option isn't far either.

Centrally, **Fox Meadow, Countryview, Stanhope and Belvedere** are all within 20 minutes of Charlottetown. **Clyde River** and **Rustico Resort** are also nearby.

A lot of the golf packages are built around accommodations. Check out **PEIsFinestGolf.com** for packages for Crowbush, Dundarave and Brudenell. Hope this helps with your planning. We can't wait to host you.

First-class Trails



Homestead Trail

Wander where trails lead. Prince Edward Island is a haven for outdoor enthusiasts, where stunning landscapes invite you to pause and trails beckon you to explore. Uncrowded trail systems wind through the timeless Wabanaki-Acadian Forest, stretch along dirt roads and crisscross the Island from tip to tip. At Glenaladale, interact with nature and the artwork of the Sculpture Forest, ski groomed cross-country trails or pedal along the picturesque Gulf Shore Parkway in the PEI National Park. For those with an adventurous spirit, tackle the Island Walk – a 700 km journey

that circumnavigates the Island. In winter, the impressive Confederation Trail transforms into a frosty playground for snowmobilers, while in warmer seasons, hikers and cyclists enjoy its beauty. Built on a historic rail line, this 449 km trail forms Prince Edward Island's section of the Trans Canada Trail. It stretches from Tignish in the west to Elmira in the east, with branch trails leading to communities across the Island. **Every trail has a story; where will you begin?**

"What are the top 5 hiking trails on PEI?"

Hi! It's hard to choose just five, but here are my thoughts.

My personal favourite is in the east of the Island and is called the **Boughton River Trail** in the community of Bridgetown. The trail runs beside Boughton River which is technically a "sunken estuary". It is 9 km in length (4.5 km in each direction) and passes through a softwood forest of spruce, balsam fir and red pine. It's very peaceful with many vistas of the scenic river.

Heading west, my next favourite is **Dromore**. This trail meanders beside the Pisquid River and features a boardwalk with flowering plants along its full length. You may also find the Lady's Slipper, the provincial flower along the trail. It is 6.5 km and is easily accessible from the Jack Campbell Road.

The next trail is **Winter River**, which runs beside a beautiful river of the same name. The river is tidal and a favourite spot for anglers. This trail is entirely on private woodland - a common feature in PEI.

Bonshaw and Strathgartney are two better-known and well-used hiking trails. They are maintained by volunteers of Cycling PEI and favourites for cyclists and walkers alike. A neat fact is that these trails were officially opened by Prince Charles and Camilla about 10 years ago, before he became King Charles III.

One more trail worth mentioning is the **Island Walk**. This 700 km trail runs along the circumference of PEI. It passes through small communities which dot the rural landscape. More than 1,000 people have tackled the walk since it was created in 2019. The route uses over 350 km of dirt roads and the Confederation Trail. Hikers enjoy the seacoast at the western and eastern tips of PEI as well as the scenic north shore, home to Anne of Green Gables.

Panmure Island

The Island's culture is rich and increasingly diverse. The Mi'kmaq called this place Epekwitk, which means "it is lying on the water". Over time, the Island has been known by many names. Prince Edward Island's story is like a rope made of intertwined strands with each traced back to its roots: Indigenous, Acadian, Irish, Scottish, Black, Lebanese and other origins. Today, our collective history remains vibrant – and we want to share it with you. Start a journey of discovery with a hands-on workshop at the Lennox Island Mi'kmaq Culture Centre or visit the Indigenous PEI Store in

Charlottetown for a curated selection of authentic art, crafts and gifts. Take part in lively Acadian culture and cuisine at the Village Musical Acadien in Abram-Village. In our capital city of Charlottetown, take a walking tour to learn about PEI as Canada's birthplace as well as the Bog, a historical Black community. Experience the life of French pioneers at Roma at Three Rivers and that of Acadians at Doucet House in South Rustico. Our history and culture remain rich and diverse, and just like the tides, **the Island's story is ever-changing.**

"What can you recommend for a solo woman in her 40s? I have a rental car and am staying in Murray River. I want to experience historic culture, see beautiful sights and relax."

Hi! Let's start with history and visit the **Cape Bear Lighthouse**. This was the first spot in Canada to receive the distress signal from the Titanic. Climb to the top of the lighthouse for a view of the PEI shoreline. While in the area, on a side road in Murray River, there are the remnants of a mill just past the MacLure dam. I often stop at this peaceful spot to enjoy the view of the river. You might even see a blue heron or an eagle fly overhead!

In the Montague area, stop at the **Garden of the Gulf Museum** and the **Roma at Three Rivers National Historic Site**, a recreation of an 18th century French settlement.

Further in Charlottetown, visit **Beaconsfield Historic House** and do a walking tour of the city. Take note of the heritage buildings. You can grab a map at the Visitor Information Centre at Founders' Food Hall and Market or at City Hall on Queen St.

Cavendish is home to Green Gables Heritage Place and **L.M. Montgomery sites**. Endless sand dunes and clear waters await you at the beaches in this area.

Back in the Murray River area, most red roads lead to the shore where you can find a stretch of sandy beach. There, you can search for shells and beach glass and enjoy the solitude!

In the evening, head to Murray Harbour for a meal at **Harbourview Restaurant**. Wander across the bridge to **Nellie's Landing** on the water to watch the sunset. Join a table for trivia on Thursday evening or enjoy

some music on the weekend. I am certain your host in Murray River will give you tips on other places to enjoy. I hope that your PEI vacation is what you want it to be. Regards,

Undeniably, we've been playing host ever since. You too can feel the Island's warmth at one of our many festivals and events celebrating everything from culinary, culture, music and more! Tap your toes at the PEI Festival of Small Halls or snap endless selfies among the tulips in spring. In summer, the choices are endless. Oysters on the half shell at the Tyne Valley Oyster Festival, harness racing at the

Summerside Lobster Carnival and Old Home Week and top culinary talent at the PEI International Shellfish Festival. Other PEI festivals showcase the Island's spirit with performances, plays, pageants, PRIDE and potato blossoms. In fall, run the PEI Marathon and feast at the Fall Flavours Food & Drink Festival. Scarecrows and spooky vibes are the prequel to craft fairs galore and holiday cheer. **In winter, bring your appetite and sense of adventure for sporting events and family festivals.**

Hi there! September is a great time to visit PEI for fantastic music festivals. There are three signature festivals that you'll want to consider as follows:

Sommo Festival: During the second weekend of September in Cavendish is a two-day beachside celebration of music, food and drink.

The **PEI International Shellfish Festival** is the following week and is considered Atlantic Canada's biggest kitchen party with music, dancing and culinary competitions.

Goolaholla Festival, hosted by Tim Chaisson and the East Pointers, is the last weekend of September.

The Fall Flavours Food & Drink Festival is a two-week series of events starting in late September. Although primarily a culinary festival, many events include music.

Hi! There are two well-known yarn shops on PEI - **MacAusland's Woolen Mill** in Bloomfield in western PEI and **Fleece and Harmony Woolen Mill** located in southeastern PEI in Belfast.

MacAusland's began producing woolen blankets in 1902 and has a lovely line of yarn as well.

Fleece and Harmony is newer and produces small batch yarn from the wool of sheep raised on the farm. The shop bursts with vibrant colours and the staff are knowledgeable spinners and knitters.

The most thorough source of information on other shops, yarn producers and creative artisans that I have found is the **PEI Fibre Trail**. Each listing gives you a description with addresses and contact info. You may also want to check out the **PEI Fibre Festival**, held here in October. Look for the map of yarn shops, sheep farms, artisans, etc.

Two great places to see rotating fibre exhibits are the **Eptek Centre** and the **MacNaught History Centre** in Summerside.

By Ferry* Experience a ferry crossing from Caribou, Nova Scotia to Wood Islands, PEI aboard Northumberland Ferries or hop aboard the CTMA Ferry for its crossing from Cap-aux-Meules, QC to Souris, PEI.

By Bridge* A 13-kilometre marvel, the Confederation Bridge is a convenient and fascinating way to arrive to PEI from New Brunswick.

By Air Prince Edward Island is accessible by air via the YYG Charlottetown Airport, a full-service domestic airport located within minutes of downtown Charlottetown.

By Bus Maritime Bus has connections to central and western Canada.

By Boat & Cruise Marinas are located at harbours around the province. Cruise ships dock at Port Charlottetown.







You are in for a real treat!

Planning your Prince Edward Island adventure starts with choosing where to stay. The Island boasts a variety of accommodations from traditional hotels, inns, cottages and resorts to unique options such as a lighthouse, treehouse, dome or barrel. It's best to book early.



The list of things to see and do on our Island is endless. Here's a sampling to whet your appetite.

Earning its reputation as **Canada's Food Island**, PEI provides an abundance of deliciousness. In addition to our world-famous potatoes, you can savour fresh fish and shellfish, including mussels



and lobster, or slice into Island beef, seasoned by salt air.

With more than 60 dairy bars and parlours to choose from, ice cream is an obvious dessert choice.



The Island is only 64 km across at its widest point, so you are never far from the ocean. You can enjoy eye-catching water views along each of the three **coastal drives** (North Cape Coastal Drive, Central Coastal Drive and Points East Coastal Drive) as well as **Gulf Shore Parkway**. You can watch the tides collide at North Cape or climb to the top of an iconic lighthouse at **West Point** or **Point Prim**.

There are countless beaches to explore with 1100 km of coastline.

The white sand beaches are strung like pearls along the north shore, such as the one at **Greenwich, PEI National Park**, which is guarded by towering sand dunes.



Red sand beaches on the south shore, like the ones found at **Chelton** and **Canoe Cove**, are ideal for wading, sea glass hunting or playing in tidal pools. Oh, and beaches are perfect for sunrise or sunset walks.



Info at a glance

WEATHER & CLIMATE

Part of Prince Edward Island's appeal is its four distinct seasons, each with unique delights.

Spring is comfortable and alive with fresh colours and temperatures ranging from 8 to 21°C (46 to 72°F).



Summer is hot with typical daytime temperatures from 20 to 25°C (70 to 77°F) with highs of 32°C (90°F). The ocean breeze is always refreshing.



In **Fall**, early season afternoons can be quite warm with cooler evenings. Temperatures usually range from 8 to 22°C (46 to 71°F).

Winter is crisp with temperatures from -3 to -11°C (12 to 26°F). On the coldest days, temperatures can feel like -25°C (-13°F). Snow



usually arrives by late December and remains until March.

HEALTH & SAFETY

Beach Safety


Here, you're never far from a spectacular beach. Swimming is pleasant due to the presence of the Gulf Stream and the very shallow shelf, which allows the water to warm up. Water temperatures can reach 20°C (70°F) in July and August. Pay attention to surf conditions;

rip currents can occur at some beaches. Be aware that swimming in the ocean is very different from swimming in a pool or lake.



Emergencies

For emergency service, dial 911 on PEI 24/7. An emergency response system can link you with translators for one of 140 languages. It is important to be able to identify your location when calling 911. Look for civic address signs in public places.



Health Insurance

Non-Canadian citizens should have private health insurance coverage when visiting PEI.

DRINKING / SMOKING

The legal age to purchase tobacco is 21 years old and you must be 19 years old to drink alcohol and purchase or possess cannabis. Both smoking and cannabis use is prohibited in public places.

TAXES

The Harmonized Sales Tax (HST) of 15% is charged on certain goods and services.



DIG YOUR MEAL

Many of our shores are rich with natural stocks of bar clams, soft-shell clams, razor clams and quahogs. A recreational licence is not required to dig clams, but you must respect season dates and limits. Look for signage to indicate when an area is closed to

harvesting. Be mindful that our shellfish resource is also a vibrant commercial fishery; conservation is important.



Travelling Paws



Pets love PEI too! Dogs on leash are “pawsitively” welcome at provincial parks. In the PEI National Park, leashed dogs are permitted on walking trails. From April 1 to October 15 pets are prohibited on all PEI National Park beaches. Please pick up after your pet in any public space.



GREEN ISLAND

Our white-sand beaches are as fragile as they are beautiful. Do not play or walk on dunes. Always stay on designated paths to protect fragile dune systems; natural habitats for plants, wildlife and shore birds. Leave your firewood home as out-of-province logs could destroy a forest. Buy local instead. Retailers do not provide plastic checkout bags. Bring reusable bags or purchase paper ones onsite.
